Work Session

1. Budget Work Session

Mr. Herring stated that they made Christmas Decor a line item and will continue until there is enough to get new decorations. They had a discussion about the banners that are hung up on the street lights, as well as the Christmas lights that have been up all year. They talked about some city office repairs, the airport fence, hangar repairs, they talked about some of the specific things that need to be repaired in the hangars, the fuel system repair, airport lights. They talked about the pump track and skills park, and the possibility of grant money and in-kind work for that project. Mr. Muhlestein talked about the specifics of the grant. They talked about lights at the ball fields. They talked about the 4th reservoir path, the visitor center roof, concession stand update, mower with bag attachment, they discussed the range of mowers and the prices. They talked about contracting the mowing or moving it in-house. They talked about buying the equipment and maintenance of the equipment. They also talked about watering, pest control, football helmets, they talked about the pros and cons of young kids playing tackle football. They talked about a storm water master plan, they do have one, but it is old. They talked about the sidewalk participation program, street maintenance project, AI software that tells what roads are in most need of repair. They talked about street cuts and repairing them up to our standards.

- 3. Finance Report/Operational Budget James Francom
 - Mr. Francom provided the operational budget. He stated that he will have a
 revised budget soon. He welcomed any questions. He stated that we are in
 pretty good shape with our revenue. He said that they need to adjust some things
 that they weren't expecting. They talked about sales tax and it will continue to go
 up before the fiscal year ends. They talked about pay out for hours when an
 employee leaves or retires.

4. City Engineer Report - Patrick Parsons

- Mr. Parsons had the monthly water report for April. He stated that we are hovering in the below average area. We have about 11.2 inches of precipitation for the year, which puts us at about 59% of the median for water. Last year we were at about 87%. He had a spreadsheet that compared the last two years. We are quite a bit lower this year. We are designated a "yellow year" right now and could possibly go to orange. He had a drought monitor map for Utah.
- Mr. Parsons stated the deep well has a constant rate test scheduled for this
 Thursday. They will run the well at 300 gallons per minute for 24 hours and test
 the limits and quality of the well. Someone will have to be on site for the full 24
 hours and take readings every 15 minutes. The readings will rate the
 performance, limits, flow, recovery etc. If all goes well with it then things will move
 forward with the well house. All went well with the repairs on well B.
- The gas line to the mill is still in the feasibility phase. The funding and demand of the mill will dictate the size of the line that is put in.
- Jones and Demille is working on the sewer master plan.
- Last year we had our state dam inspection and got a thumbs up on it.
- Mr. Herring stated that David Lyman has put in some applications for grants to put



in treatment plants at every well that would address the arsenic issue.

Business Items

1. Resolution - 05-27-2025-1 UORG Grant for the 4th Reservoir Walking Trail

- The City of Blanding is committed to enhancing the quality of life for its residents and visitors through the development and improvement of outdoor recreation opportunities. The City of Blanding has applied for and has been awarded funding through the Utah Outdoor Recreation Grant (UORG) administered by the Utah Division of Outdoor Recreation for the development of the 4th Reservoir Walking Path Project. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$548,920, with \$438,840 to be provided through the UORG award, the City of Blanding has committed to providing a local cash match of \$80,080, and \$30,000 will be provided as an in-kind contribution from Blanding City staff and volunteers, including support from the Utah Dedicated Hunter Program, \$80,080 will be provided as a cash match from the City of Blanding, while the City actively seeks additional opportunities to increase the in-kind portion of the project contribution in alignment with grant matching goals.
- Mr. Muhlestein stated that the project will start as soon as possible. The city has
 to have a signed contract with the state before work can start.

Councilmember Nielson made a motion to approve Resolution 05-27-2025-1, accepting the UORG grant, the city's match and in-kind contributions for the 4th reservoir walking trail. Councilmember Ewald seconded the motion. Mayor Pro Temp Bowers repeated the motion and asked for discussion or questions. Hearing none, she called for a vote.

Discussion/Informational Items

1. R-2 Zoning Update - Ben Muhlestein

Mr. Muhlestein stated the planning commission has worked hard on revising the R2 code and trying to make it easier for people to build. He provided the updated code with the changes that the planning commission has been discussing for the last several months. Mr. Muhlestein went over some of the changes that have been made. Mr. Herring stated that some cities have a buy out plan for open space or play ground requirements for larger developments with multiple units and then that money can go towards existing parks. They talked about taking hospitals



out as an option in the R2, but keeping nursing homes and assisted living in. They talked about professional offices in the R2 and what the definition and requirements should be. They talked about the pros and cons of professional offices in a residential zone. They talked about ADUs and the size and use of them. They talked about airbnbs, mother-in-law suites, parking and property owner rights. The commission wanted the whole temporary conditional use section removed. They had a substantial discussion about this section, in particular about professional businesses and offices, they discussed different scenarios and what they think should happen and what they think should remain in the code and what should be taken out or what should be changed. They talked about the changes in the area, width, setback and height requirements. The commission wanted to make some changes to make it easier for development. They talked about the private and shared drive section, this is a new section, but some changes have been made in the process of making it. They briefly talked about fences, walls and retaining walls.

2. Budget Discussion Continued if needed

 Council will have a work session on June 10th from 5:30-7:00 to continue discussing the budget.

3. Local Products sold at the Blanding Visitor's Center - Trent Herring

 Mr. Herring stated that they started talking with Bears Ears Farms about selling their products and there is a lot of red tape and restrictions involved with selling CBD/THC products. The city feels that there are too many requirements and liabilities in selling the products. They still want to promote their business with brochures and pamphlets, etc.

4. Business License Interlocal Agreement Approved by San Juan County - Trent Herring

Mr. Herring stated that he went to the county meeting last week and they
approved this interlocal agreement and all the other communities in San Juan
County should be approving this agreement as well. Blanding City will now
accept any business licenses from the other communities.

5. Energy Fuels Ribbon Cutting Event June 23rd - Ice Cream Social - Trent Herring

• This event is going to be moved to June 25th. Energy fuels wants to have a ribbon cutting community event for the shade structure at the park. It will be at 6pm and there will be ice cream sandwiches for the public as well as pickleball games and corn hole. The grant for the shade structure was the biggest grant that energy fuels has given.

6. Little Miss Blanding June 26th - Trent Herring

• Little Miss Blanding will be on June 19 or 26th.

7. Youth City Council Success - Trent Herring

Mr. Herring highlighted the success of the youth city council's first year. He
mentioned the scholarships awarded, the artwork on the dugouts, and their
involvement in the futures football game. Applications for the next year's youth city
council are already being received, indicating the program's positive impact. The
council expressed their support for the program and its benefits for youth
engagement.

One/Two Lot subdivision policy:

In the interest of expediting smaller subdivisions that don't require the kinds of utility/infrastructure updates that minor and major subdivisions often need, the Planning Commission has reviewed a policy for small lot subdivisions. (Attached on the next page) This proposed change would speed up the process for many potential divisions in the city and free up Planning and Zoning to deal with larger ones in the future.

Officers Palmer and Blake attended the ARIDE (Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement) class taught by the Department of Public Safety.


Officer Stewart attended the annual Utah Children's Justice Symposium.

ORDINANCE 2025-11

AN ORDINANCE OF BLANDING CITY APPROVING THE ANNEXATION AND DISCONNECTION AGREEMENT BETWEEN BLANDING CITY AND LEONARD HOWE

WHEREAS, Blanding City is authorized under Utah law to annex and disconnect property within its jurisdiction to promote orderly growth and development; and

WHEREAS, Leonard Howe has requested an annexation and disconnection agreement with Blanding City to adjust property boundaries to align with the existing plat map and ensure proper land use planning; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed the proposed annexation and disconnection agreement, as shown in the attached plat map, and has determined that the adjustment will enhance the clarity and efficiency of property boundaries within the City; and

WHEREAS, all necessary procedures for annexation and disconnection, including public notice and hearings, have been followed in accordance with applicable laws and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the annexation and disconnection agreement serves the best interests of the City and the property owner by ensuring appropriate municipal services and zoning designations;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BLANDING, UTAH:

- Approval of Agreement: The Annexation and Disconnection Agreement between Blanding City and Leonard Howe, as set forth in the attached plat map, is hereby approved.
- 2. **Boundary Adjustment:** The City's official boundaries shall be adjusted in accordance with the agreement and the attached plat map, ensuring the affected property is properly incorporated into the City's jurisdiction.
- 3. **Recording and Implementation:** The City Manager and City Recorder are authorized and directed to take all necessary actions to record the ordinance and agreement with the appropriate county and state offices.
- 4. **Severability:** If any provision of this Ordinance is found to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.
- 5. **Effective Date:** This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and adoption by the City Council and proper recording with the relevant authorities.

Blanding City Watering Guide

Use Water Wisely — Protect Our Future

As our region continues to face drought conditions, **Blanding City is taking proactive steps** to conserve our most precious resource: water. Rather than implementing the next level of **Orange Tier water restrictions**, which would result in **significant cost increases for water users**, we are encouraging our community to **act now** by adopting smart watering practices.

Together, we can make a difference by using water wisely — and delaying or even avoiding the need for more restrictive and costly measures.

Smart Watering Guidelines

1. Water Only Three Days Per Week

Choose **any three non-consecutive days** per week to water your lawn or landscaping. This helps prevent overwatering while allowing roots to stay healthy and hydrated.

2. Water in the Evening or Early Morning

Avoid watering during the **heat of the day (10 AM – 6 PM)** when evaporation is highest. Instead, water between **8 PM and 8 AM** to maximize absorption and minimize waste.

3. Check Your System for Leaks or Runoff

Inspect your sprinklers, drip systems, and hoses for leaks. Make sure water stays on your landscaping and does not run into sidewalks, driveways, or streets.

4. Adjust Sprinklers Based on the Weather

When rain is in the forecast or has occurred recently, **turn off your irrigation** to avoid unnecessary watering. Most grass only needs about **1 inch of water per week**, including rainfall.

5. Use Mulch and Native Plants

Mulch around trees and plants helps retain soil moisture. Native and drought-tolerant plants require less water and thrive in our high desert climate.

6. Mow Higher, Water Less

Set your mower blade higher to encourage deeper roots and retain soil moisture, reducing the need for frequent watering.

10.5B R-2 Residential District

10.5B.1 Purpose

The R-2 residential district is intended as a high density residential, office and institutional area, providing living accommodations for the small or nonfamily, and providing services to the broader community.

10.5B.2 Permitted Uses

- A. Permanent single-family dwelling. Minimum square footage of living space seven hundred (700).
- B. Permanent two-family dwellings. Minimum square footage of living space seven hundred (700) per unit.
- C. Multiple-family dwelling.
- D. Permitted ADU's (accessory dwelling units), interior, attached, detached.
 - 1. Minimum square footage per dwelling unit, seven-two hundred fifty six (256700) square feet per unit 1. Multiple- family dwellings in this article are regarded as any complex containing three (3) or more units. Complexes consisting of eight or more dwelling unitsef this nature are required, as part of the plot plan, to include a designated play area(s) in the form of open space with landscaping, further amenities at the discretion of the developer such as: swings, slides, sand box, picnic table, etc. The number of these open space areas are to be determined by the number of units to be developed using the following scale:

Number Of Dwellings (Unit #)	Open Space Requirements
4 - 8 <u>and up</u>	To be considered by the city planner or building official1
8 <u>9 - 16</u>	2
16 and up	To be considered by the city planner or building official

- All multiple-family dwelling units must meet minimum standards in square footage per dwelling unit, off street parking requirements, landscaping and open space requirements on the same zone lot prior to receiving final plot plan approval.
- 3. Studio apartments are allowable under the following conditions:
 - a. The unit shall have a living room of not less than two hundred twenty (220) square feet of superficial floor area. An additional one hundred (100) square feet of superficial floor area shall be provided for each occupant of such unit in excess of two (2).
 - b. The unit shall be provided with a separate closet.
 - c. The unit shall be provided with a kitchen sink, cooking appliance and refrigeration facilities, each having a clear working space of not less than thirty inches (30") in front. Light and ventilation conforming to current building code shall be provided.

- d. The unit shall be provided with a separate bathroom containing a water closet, lavatory and bathtub or shower.
- 4. All other requirements of the R-2 zone are required in any studio apartment development.
- D. Public parks and playgrounds.
- E. Public and private school, elementary and secondary.
- F. Boarding and rooming house.
- G. $\frac{\text{Hospitals}}{\text{Months}}$, $\frac{\text{Nnursing homes and}}{\text{months}}$ and $\frac{\text{assisted living/long term care facilities}}{\text{months}}$.
- H. Professional offices such as Attorney offices, Accountants and tax preparers, Architects and engineers,
 Real estate agents or brokers, Insurance agents, Therapists, counselors, or psychologists and
 Consultants.
 - Limited Client Traffic: The use shall generate only minimal foot traffic. The volume and frequency of visitors shall be consistent with the character and scale of the surrounding residential area.
 - Restricted Signage: One non-illuminated wall-mounted sign is allowed, not exceeding [e.g., two (2) square feet] in area. Freestanding, backlit, or flashing signs are prohibited.
 - Indoor Operations Only: All business activities shall be conducted entirely within the interior
 of the primary structure. No outdoor work, storage, or display of materials is permitted.
 - Use Restrictions: No industrial operations, manufacturing, or on-site retail activity shall be conducted. Offices shall be limited to professional or technical services (e.g., consulting, design, legal, accounting, therapy).
 - Low Impact: The use shall not generate noise, odors, fumes, light, or vehicular traffic in excess of what is typical for residential uses. On-site parking shall accommodate all expected use without creating a nuisance or requiring street overflow.
- J. as but not limited to medical and dental clinics, law, insurance, architect, and accounting offices.
- Churches and parish houses.
- Higher educational institutions and vocational schools.
- M.K. Essential public utility and public service installations and facilities for the benefit and protection of the surrounding area; such uses shall not include business offices, repair, sales or storage facilities.

10.5B.3 Accessory Uses

Any use which complies with all of the following conditions may be operated as an accessory use to a permitted use:

A. Is clearly incidental and customary to and commonly associated with the operation of the permitted use;

and

- B. Is operated under the same ownership and on the same zone lot as the permitted use; and
- C. Does not include structures or structural features inconsistent with the permitted use; and
- D. Does not include a floor area of over fifty percent (50%) of the floor area of the permitted use or one thousand (1,000) square feet, whichever is larger.
- E. May include residential occupancy.

10.5B.4 Home Occupations

Home occupations shall be allowed, provided all the following conditions are met. All home occupations must have a plan review prior to obtaining a business license:

A. Such use must be conducted entirely within a dwelling; and

- B. Such use must be clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the dwelling for dwelling purposes and must not change the residential character thereof; and
- C. The total area used for such purposes may not exceed twenty five percent (25%) of the first floor area of the user's dwelling unit; and
- D. There must be no advertising display or other indications of the home occupation on the premises, except that may be specifically allowed (see section 10-12-4 of this title, sign regulations in zoning districts); and
- E. There shall be only limited sales of stock, supplies or products conducted on the premises; and
- F. There must be no exterior storage on the premises of material or equipment used as a part of the home occupation; and
- G. There must be no offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odors, heat or glare noticeable at or beyond the property line; and
- H. A home occupation must provide adequate off street parking to accommodate all needs created by the home occupation (parking same as Commercial District, see subsection 10-6A-7A of this title).

10.5B.5 Conditional Uses

The following may be allowed conditional uses in the R-2 District:

A. Historic buildings. Historic buildings may be used for offices and accessory commercial uses and/or limited retail businesses, subject to the same restrictions as set forth in section 10-5A-5 of this title, R-1 district.

10.5B.6 Temporary Conditional Uses

The following may be allowed as temporary conditional uses in the R-2 district:

A. RV's or travel trailers. Mobile homes. A maximum of one RV or travel trailermobile home per building lot may be allowed for the use and occupancy of the owner or lessee of said lot, or agent of either, an if such occupancy is deemed necessary to provide said person and/or his family a place to live while a permanent

structure is being constructed on said building lot for their occupancy.

- 1. Permit Required: The placement or use of a recreational vehicle (RV) or travel trailer on any lot for this purpose shall require a valid permit issued by the City.
- 2. Permit Duration: Each permit shall be valid for a period of one (1) year from the date of issuance.
- 3. Permit Fees:
 - a. The first permit issued for a lot shall be provided at no cost to the applicant.
 - b. A second permit for the same lot shall require a fee of two thousand dollars (\$2,000).
- 0. Permit Limit Per Lot: No more than five (5) total permits may be issued for this purpose per property owner.any single lot, regardless of ownership changes or time intervals between permits.
- 0.4. RV's or travel trailers Mobile homes. A maximum of one RV or travel trailer mobile home per building lot may be allowed for the use and occupancy of aged or handicapped family members of the owner or lessee of said lot, or agent of either, and if such occupancy is deemed necessary to provide the needed care of said family member, and providing the following conditions are met:
- 4-5. The city council approves the issuance of the conditional use by resolution. The permit must be renewed every two (2) years; and
- 2-6. The setbacks, lot size, height and lot coverage requirements of the zone district be fully complied with: and
- 3.7. A minimum of twenty feet (20') be maintained between the mobile home and any other structure; and
- 4-8. The conditional use permit expires and the RV or travel trailermobile home is removed when the need no longer exists.

10.5B.7 Area, Width, Setback And Height Requirements

- A. Minimum lot area: Four thousand and fifty Seven thousand (4.0507,000) square feet.
- B. Minimum lot width: $\underline{\text{Forty five}}\underline{\text{Seventy}}$ feet ($\underline{\text{45}70}$ ') at the front setback line.
- C. Minimum front setback for structures:
 - 1. For properties abutting local or collector streets, twenty feet (20').
 - 2. For properties abutting arterial streets, forty feet (40').
- D. Minimum rear setback for structure:
 - 1. Structure containing a permitted use, twenty feet (20').
 - 2. Structure containing an accessory use only, five feet (5').
- E. Minimum side setback for structures:
 - Side setback not abutting a street, seven feet (7'), or one foot (1') for each three feet (3') of building height or fraction thereof, whichever is greater.
 - 2. Side setback abutting a local or collector street, fifteen feet (15').
 - 3. Side setback abutting an arterial street, forty feet (40').
- F. Maximum building height:
 - 1. Buildings containing a permitted use, fifty feet (50').

2	Ruildings	containing at	accessory use	only	thirty feet (30')

G. Maximum lot coverage:

- 1. Dwelling units and their accessory uses shall cover no more than fifty percent (50%) of the total lot
- 2. All other permitted uses and their accessory uses shall cover no more than forty percent (40%) of the total lot area

10.5B.7.1 Private and Shared Private Drives on Deep Lots

A. <u>A subdivided lot</u>Deep lots, defined as those with a depth greater than twice the frontage, may include the design and construction of a private drive or a shared private drive.

B.A. Private Drive:

- A private drive is permitted provided that it is dedicated to a single lot and meets all applicable requirements of this section.
- It shall be set back a minimum of five (5) feet from adjacent property lines to ensure safety and privacy.
- It must be designed toin accordance with local engineering standards, ensureensuring proper drainage, turning radius, and pedestrian safety.
- It shall not interfere with required public access or emergency vehicle routes.

C. Shared Private Drive:

- A shared private drive is permitted when multiple contiguous lots, or parcels within a planned development, agree to share a common drive that provides access for all designated properties.
- The shared drive must be documented in an easement or similar legal instrument and recorded with the local land records to ensure consistent maintenance and usage protocols.
- Design standards applicable to a private drive apply equally to a shared private drive, including the minimum setback of five (5) feet from adjacent property lines where applicable.
- Private roads may be built if the developer executes an agreement with the City stating the City will not be
 responsible for the financing, bonding, engineering, or any other technical for professional components, etc.
 The developer or property owners who access the private road shall finance, and pay for the appropriate
 designing, engineering, and inspections, etc. The plan must include provisions for shared maintenance, clearly
 identifying responsibilities of each property owner and ensuring that the drive remains in safe condition for all
 users. These provisions must be included in a legal
- Shared private drives must not create any conflict with municipal services or emergency vehicle access, and their design should facilitate clear ingress and egress for each lot.

D. Approval Process:

- The inclusion of any private drive, whether dedicated or shared, shall be clearly indicated on the plot plan and
 must be approved as part of thethe conditional use or final plot plan review process.
- Plans involving shared private drives may require additional review to ensure that maintenance, legal easements, and design standards are adequately addressed.

10.5B.9 Fences, Walls And Retaining Walls

- A. Fences, walls and retaining walls up to forty eight inches (48") in height may be erected on any part of the zone lot
- B. Fences, walls and retaining walls, on an interior lot, may be erected to a height of seventy two inches (72") on any part of the zone lot not in front setback space. Open clear chainlink fencing with no solid blocking of any type, including trees or other landscaping, may be erected to a height of seventy two inches (72") in the front setback on an interior lot.
- C. Fences, walls and retaining walls, on a corner lot, may be erected to a height of seventy two inches (72") on any part of the zone lot, except for the following:
 - 1. Open clear chainlink with no solid blocking trees or other landscaping may be erected to a height of seventy two inches (72") in the front setback on a corner lot; and
 - 2. "Sight triangle" areas explained as follows: A triangular area formed by the street property lines and a line connecting them at points thirty feet (30') from the intersection of such property lines. These sight triangle areas are to contain no obstructions to the view of the driver of a vehicle. Any fencing, landscaping or other improvements placed within the area of the triangle shall allow visibility across the area. Only open clear chainlink fencing with no sight obstructions, including vegetation, may be erected in the sight triangle up to a height of seventy two inches (72"). All other fencing, walls and retaining walls, shrubs, boulders, ground covers, landscaping and similar improvements shall be maintained at or below a height of forty eight inches (48") above grade (ground level).
- D. Barbed wire, sharp pointed metal and electrically charged fences shall not be permitted.
- E. Fences shall be maintained in a good state of repair.
- F. Open mesh fences of any height may be erected on zone lots containing schools, public parks and playgrounds.
- G. The height of fences under this section shall include combinations of walls and fences. The height allowances shall be measured from the high side of adjoining properties allowing each property the right to a six foot (6') privacy wall, fence or a combination from finished grade.

.1 Pre-Submission Conference

Any person wishing to subdivide land within the City shall secure from the Building and Zoning staff information pertaining to the requirements for subdivisions and the City's plan of streets, parks, drainage, open space, access, zoning and other Master Plan requirements affecting the land to be subdivided.

.2 Requirements for Two lot subdivisions

Any person seeking at One/Two lot subdivision must meet the following criteria:

- 1. The lot to be divided must be less than one and a half (1.5) acres in size.
- 2. The resulting subdivision must already be serviced by city streets and utilities.
 - a. The building of a private/shared drive as part of a subdivision is NOT included in this requirement
 - b. Utility Service laterals may be installed at a later date.
- 3. Prior to approval and recording the owner shall also submit the following:
- 4. A. Proof of lot ownership.

.3 Prepare Plan

The owner shall then have a licensed surveyor prepare a plan and shall submit (1) copy of the same to the Building and Zoning Staff. Said plan shall be prepared in accordance with City standards.

Said plan shall contain at a scale of not less than one inch equals fifty (50) feet:

- A. Property boundary
- B. Adjacent property owners
- C. Proposed lots and their approximate dimensions
- D. Other information required by staff or other public agencies
- E. Title Report or Title Insurance Policy for the land to be subdivided verifying property ownership.
- F. Tax Clearance Certificate from the state indicating that all taxes, interest, and penalties owing on the land have been paid.
- G. An affidavit from the applicant certifying that the submitted information is true and accurate
